- Capacity-building, empowerment and information
- Cooperatives are learning organizations
- Cooperation among cooperatives
- Concern for community: active and locally based bottom-up dynamic

Gender and cooperatives



"Shared influence and responsibilities are the key to cooperative excellence"

(ICA-resolution on Gender Equality in Cooperatives)

- Democratic processes require shared decision-making between women and men
- Contribution towards gender equality by expanding women's opportunities to participate in local economies
- Strong links between women's cooperative involvement and poverty reduction

How Cooperatives Contribute to Gender Equality and Women's Economic Empowerment

Improved work conditions

Economic empowerment Equal access to paid work Transition opportunities to the formal economy through cooperation Access to business capital, financing, and market places Access to opportunities to gain skills and knowledge for economic activity Economic development in rural areas

Fair and adequate earnings / equal pay for equal value of work Decent work in safe working conditions Collective bargaining power Increased levels of participatory democracy in the workplace Social empowerment

Learning opportunities such as technical skills improvement and management training Affordable and accessible goods and services Improved self-esteem and confidence

Women engaged in cooperative



- Health: addressing maternal and infant care
- Education: Development of scholarship programs
- **Credits:** Savings and Credit Cooperative Societies (SACCOS) allow access to fund/capital
- Work: ensuring fair wages and reduce exploitation.
- Agriculture: farmers share use of tools and machinery
- **Consumer:** using economy of scale
- Energy and agriculture: producing energy with biomass
- Energy: women become producers, installers and beneficiaries: whole value chain

Women and energy



- Women as energy managers
- Unpaid & unappreaciated workload
- Lack of awareness on inequalities
- Inadequate structures for women's participation

Women and energy



- Energy poverty has gender dimensions
 - No access to affordable and safe energy
 - Indoor pollution affects mostly health of women/children
 - Low income households live in less energy efficient houses
- Energy services and programs can promote women's skills and employment
 - Women are still not represented equally in energy leadership positions
- Energy policies and programs need to be gender sensitive
 - Women are most primary energy managers but not decision makers

Gender-just energy cooperative

- Equal access to women in whole energy value chain: technologies, jobs, funding, dividend
- Reduce workload: save cost and time
- Provides control over energy production and consumption
- Foster women's empowerment & leadership
- Engage for cooperative gender and energy policy

→ Beneficiary and people-centred approach pays particular attention to small-scale and community-based actions, where women are over-represented
